PLANNING WORKING GROUP.

CRA Planning Group

1-23 Rathdowne Street - The highlight of the year was the permit application appeal to VCAT in relation to this site. VCAT refused to grant a permit. Will the applicant re-apply?

Clyde hotel - CRA have objected to their application for extended trading hours and additional patron allowances.

King and Godfrey - A similar application to the above. CRA objected and CoM have determined to grant a permit with conditions. We have not decided whether to appeal to VCAT.

El Giza – CRA submitted an objection to the application for an extension to the liquor trading hours. The application was refused.

TRAFFIC, TRANSPORT, PARKING & NOISE POLLUTION. CRA Mobility Plan

Grattan Street changes - CRA supports the proposed changes to Grattan Street including reduced traffic lanes and improved bicycle lanes and pedestrian access.

We are insisting that Queensberry Street traffic be reduced to the former levels when Grattan Street is reopened. We await plans for Grattan Street between Bouverie Street and Royal Parade that runs through the University of Melbourne Estate Plan area.

We are pushing City of Melbourne to formulate an acceptable e-scooter policy.

WORLD HERITAGE DOES MATTER

This National Treasure deserves to be carefully managed, protected and preserved under one Governing Body only.

The CRA has been part of the Royal Exhibition Building and Carlton Gardens Review which began in 2020 when the world Heritage Steering Committee sought feedback on how the plan could be improved. Why we review? Because in accordance of the requirements of the *Heritage Act 2017* every seven years the World Heritage Management plan for the Royal Exhibition Building and Carlton Gardens is reviewed. Now after four years of reviews and planning we are still waiting to get approval from the minister for planning. Read more at Engage Victoria

The **Royal Exhibition Building** is managed by the Victorian Government through Museums Victoria.

The City of Melbourne manages the Carlton Gardens.

(However, the Museum manages part of what is known as the Carlton Gardens).


What we want:

An Independent Statuary Authority responsible for the management of the World Heritage site and the Buffer Zone.

Our plan in 2024 is to continue to lobby the different bodies who manage the Gardens on the importance of the Heritage Carlton Gardens and especially the importance of preserving the trees.

We will continue to voice our other concerns regarding:

- Our concern that the Melbourne City Council has given the Garden Show a three year lease, seemingly without consulting any other governing bodies such as Heritage Victoria or the Heritage Council.
- The trees are suffering badly despite care by the gardeners and adequate water. Why is this happening?
- The disregard for the Wildlife of the Gardens thus wrecking the delicate ecosystem.
- The damage from heavy equipment, huge vehicles and concrete blocks which damage the trees and lawn each year.
- Huge fences which are put up weeks before and after cutting out the public from using the Gardens.
- In the last 12 years especially, the population of the area surrounding the gardens
 has increased exponentially. People use the Gardens not only for walking, running,
 get fit classes, escaping the heat of the city and weddings but also for leisure
 gatherings every day not just weekends.

Proposal presented to City of Melbourne regarding the Garden and Flower Show – Martin Brennan

Proposal to evaluate the current venue (Carlton Gardens) for the Melbourne International Flower and Garden Show and to consider an alternative venue (Birrarung Marr) following the conclusion of the current contract in 2026.

Background

In 2004 the Royal Exhibition Building and Carlton Gardens was included on the National Heritage List under the Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 and on the State Heritage Register of Victoria in 1998 under the Heritage Act 1995. The listing requires that any proposed use inside or outside the boundaries of a National Heritage or a World Heritage Property that has an impact on the heritage values is not permissible under the Heritage Act 1995 or without the approval of the Federal Minister.

In 1996 the City of Melbourne as the Committee of Management for Carlton Gardens issued a licence to Melbourne International Flower and Garden Show Ltd to conduct the show in the Carlton Gardens. This was to be an international show that would attract visitors from across Victoria, Australia and beyond to Melbourne to enjoy the role of flowers and gardens in our lives and spend time in the City and the State. However the MIFGS has attracted only around 100,000 paying customers over 5 days each year and its pull and positioning of Melbourne and Victoria has not been reflected in the impact as was promised.

The MIFGS occupies a large section of the southern section of the Carlton Gardens and requires for set up and staging purposes this area of the Gardens being closed to the general public for 2 to 3 weeks plus the 5 days of the Show. The closure of the gardens make it difficult for those who traverse the Gardens on their way to and from the City and also children often with their parents who make their way to and from the two adjacent schools. The closure also impacts on those who spend time relaxing and enjoying the ambience of the garden environment 7 days a week. This is a high price for users of the Gardens to pay for the commercial use of the Carlton Gardens.

The repair to the Carlton Gardens following the heavy traffic of bumping in and out of the exhibitors and those who visit the Show has according to the Council provided 'no evidence of long term damage'. However many would argue that the impact in the short term is observable in the form of long term scarring of the lawns and the long term damage is arguable.

In September 2022 a 3 year licence was granted to MIFGS (2024 – 2026) with 3 year option (2027 – 2029) by mutual agreement. As reported in the Inner City News (September, 2022) under the headline, 'Flower and Garden Show issued new licence for Carlton Gardens, but heritage concerns remain', the article stated 'City of Melbourne councillors have given the all clear for the Melbourne International Flower and Garden Show (MIFGS) to continue to be held in Carlton Gardens despite continued concerns from heritage groups over the event's "damaging impact" on the World Heritage-listed site'.

Proposal

The Carlton Residents Association believes that following three decades of locating the MIFGS in the Carlton Gardens it is time for to consult on the future of the MIFGS and provide an evaluation of the short and long term impact of the use of the Carlton Gardens as a venue and how the City of Melbourne can gain additional value from the hosting the MIFGS in the future.

This should include the added value in terms of audience reach and City trader buy in that could be derived by staging the MIFGS in a central city location such as Birrarung Marr, a purposebuilt event

venue, the leveraging of the MIFGS into a 14 day festival, and the refocusing of the MIFGS on Greenline and its staging posts including Federation Square.

We therefore believe that there is an arguable case for the Melbourne City Council to give consideration to relocating the MIFGS to Birrarung Marr. The CRA has identified a number of advantages that we believe the Council and the community and stakeholders should consider in an appraisal of the current location and a relocation of the MIFGS..

In 2002 the City Council established Birrarung Marr as an urban park on the north bank of the Yarra River, next to Federation Square as a place for community and to celebrate public activities, major events, and festivals. It is the first public space in the City to be created for over a century and holds a special place in the indigenous history of Melbourne located on the lands of the Wurundjeriu of the Kulin Nation. In the 2018 Masterplan it was estimated that some 4.6 million visitors annually visit Birrarung Marr with 90% coming from metro Melbourne and across Victoria and interstate. The planned Greenline project along the northern backs of the Yarra will extend from Birrarung Marr to the Bolte Bridge. It's a green infrastructure intervention that will add to the City of Melbourne's credentials as a liveable and sustainable city. It follows that existing and proposed developments along the northern banks of the Yarra will be enhanced by the Greenline including Federation Square which will be activated as a focal point for the City to display, celebrate its past, present and future.

The opportunity to move the MIFGS from Carlton Gardens to Birrarung Marr and the centre of the city will enhance its status both nationally and internationally. The MIFGS could be expanded into a 14 day 'Festival of Flowers' that would increase both participants and audience and place the City of Melbourne at the epicentre of the international greening cities movement. A 'Festival of Flowers' would extend from Birrarung Marr along Greenline and be celebrated at Federation Square in a Community Gardens display bringing those from across Melbourne in an exhibition and promotion of gardening for food and health. It would allow city based businesses, in the retail and hospitality sectors, to promote their venues with flower displays and green produce and could culminate in a 'Blooming Ball' at the Melbourne Town Hall. There are many opportunities to be gained from a venue move to Birrarung Marr in 2026.

This is an opportunity needing to be explored.
